Bipartisan Group Of Former Federal & Georgia Prosecutors File Brief In Georgia Case Opposing "Meritless" Trump Motion To Quash Special Purpose Grand Jury Report, Preclude Use Of Evidence, And Recuse Fulton County DA's Office

"Former President Donald J. Trump seeks what in Amici's experience is extraordinary and unwarranted relief from this Court."

A bipartisan group of eight former federal and Georgia state prosecutors <u>filed an amicus brief</u> in the Superior Court of Fulton County Georgia on May 19 opposing former President Donald Trump's motion to quash the Special Purpose Grand Jury (SPGJ) report, preclude the use of any evidence derived from it, and recuse Fulton County District Attorney Fani Willis's office.

The former prosecutors collectively have decades of experience with the structure and process of law enforcement investigations, grand jury proceedings, charging decisions, and the ethical rules and restrictions that apply to prosecutors and judges.
